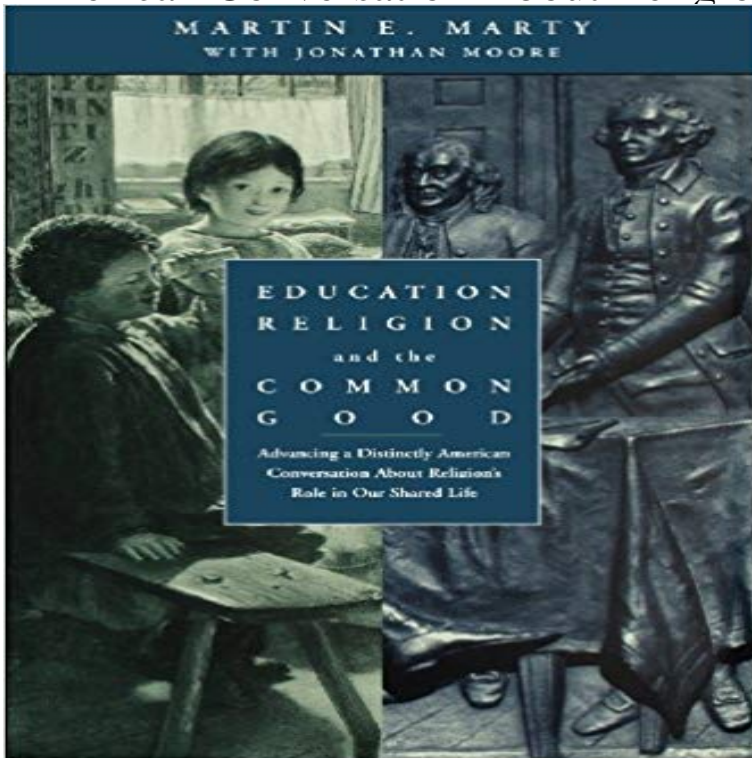


Education, Religion, and the Common Good: Advancing a Distinctly American Conversation About Religions Role in Our Shared Life
